Strategic Initiatives

The **Enabling Access** initiative supports work with a broad range of local and regional groups and individuals to help improve key Internet infrastructures, to extend technical knowledge and core networking skills, and to develop new technology leaders.

The **InterNetWorks** initiative aims to advance the health of the Internet in all areas, from the evolution of its infrastructure to its stewardship. It provides a platform to ensure a common and open Internet, to tackle global addressing issues, to support and advance information technology security and stability, and to explore and catalog the impact of alternative networks, such as mobile data and sensor networks.

The **Trust and Identity** initiative demonstrates the Internet Society's commitment to secure, reliable, private channels of communication between entities that can be clearly authenticated and interoperable. It recognizes that the ability to manage identifying information on a network is a fundamental requirement for users and that trust-enabling network protocols must be at the heart of the Internet's architecture.





The **Internet Society's Bureaus and offices in Africa, Asia, Europe, Latin America, and North America** support regional activities guided by global principles that promote education and training, capacity building, and policy initiatives.
